Science Experiment

Pastel Colors

- Materials
 - Red, blue, yellow, and green paint
 - White paint
 - Paper
 - Paint brushes
- Activity
 - Place the red blue, yellow, or green paint on the paper.
 - Add the white paint and mix the two colors.
 - Observe and explain how mixing white with another color will create a pastel color.

Quick Tip: Place the paints in the art or the science center and allow the children to experiment with creating pastel colors.

 - Take a nature walk and observe the signs of springtime.
 - Encourage the children to draw their observations.
 - Ask the children to tell you about their drawings then record their explanations.
